Why is it important to properly dispose of household hazardous waste? It keeps harmful chemicals out of our air, soil and waterways. Many chemicals are ignitable, corrosive, reactive and/or toxic. Mercury in fluorescent bulbs is carcinogenic and damage the nervous system. Batteries can explode under heat or pressure.

Gasoline*

• Use it to fuel your car or gas-powered lawnmower

Household cleaners (Degreasers, Drain Cleaner, Household Lye, Metal Cleaner, Ammonia-based Cleaners, paint remover) *

• Take it to a HHW event

Herbicides/Weed-Killers*

• Take it to a HHW event

Hydrogen Peroxide (not hazardous)

• Pour down drain and recycle bottle

Isopropyl Alcohol (Rubbing Alcohol) *

• Use to defrost car windshield and windows (Mixed 1/3 of a cup of water with 2/3 of a cup rubbing alcohol)

- Liquid medication- pour leftover into a paper towel and recycle bottle

Motor Oil*

• Take to auto care center (like Pep Boys, Jiffy Lubes, Auto Zone, Tires Plus etc.)

Nail Polish

• Open the cap and let it dry out, then toss in trash

Paint and paint thinner *

- If reusable and at least half full, donate to Habitat for Humanity or local non-profit
- Especially if it is reusable white, black, or primer paint, try to sell it on a yard sale group
- If it is latex paint and in poor quality, open the lid and let it dry out and then toss it in the trash
- Only paint thinners, spray paint and oil-based paints are accepted at HHW events
